Royal Institute of Navigation TopNav

TopNav is a competition using traditional navigation methods (no GPS, no magenta line to follow) run at 5 UK airfields on different days and involves a flight of around 90 minutes. Marks are allocated, determined mainly on planning, accuracy (time/position), appropriate changes to plan (as long as satisfactorily explained).

Neville (pilot) and I (scribe) flew in DENS from Compton Abbas at the end of April. Neville has taken part twice before (winning once) so knows the ropes; we had a practice beforehand to work out procedures for photographing turning points, logging, etc. On the day we were given a set of eight grid locations in a grand tour surrounding the Salisbury Plain danger areas.

Preparing the route and timing took longer than expected, but once underway, in bright sunlight with a fair amount of thermal activity

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making writing the log difficult, the flight worked as planned, the waypoints behaved themselves and turned up on time, the only diversion off route (justified in our log) being to avoid paragliders.

We reached the end point within 1 minute of our predicted time – though the final arbiters will be the RIN dataloggers that we carried. We're still waiting to hear results following completion at all locations. One lesson learned — don't leave the IPhone on the coaming in full sun; when wanting to take a photo at the first turning point it displayed 'temperature warning—emergency calls only'. Fortunately Neville's was OK.

Why not try TopNav sometime - good practice. One day your navigation display may disappear! Trevor

Last month's meeting

Information from the CAA and elsewhere

A bit outside our area, but the BGA has reported on discussions about flying in the busy Lakenheath/ Mildenhall CMATZ area in East Anglia, with a number of VRPs agreed for use with the USAF ATC, particularly in view of two high-risk mil/glider airproxes in the last year. If you plan to fly in that area you may benefit from reading this.

A significant collection of historic Rolls-Royce engines will soon have a new home at Aerospace Bristol. The museum is working in partnership with Rolls-Royce and Rolls-Royce Heritage Trust to develop a historic aircraft hangar on the Aerospace Bristol site into a new museum store. Hangar 16R will house engines from the Rolls-Royce Heritage Trust collection alongside museum objects on show to visitors for the first time. The partnership will also provide a space for Rolls-Royce Heritage Trust volunteers to work on conserving the engines. More here.

The January newsletter mentioned an Airspace Change Proposal (ACP) from the National Police Air Service for a TRA and TMZ over the Bristol Channel for the purposes of a Beyond Visual Line of Sight (BVLOS) trial of a surveillance drone. The proposal is now being reworked in two parts, the first for a TDA for the 90-day nighttime portion, the second to follow for a TRA and TMZ for the remaining 90 days. Some changes have been made to the trial area, particularly lowering the upper limit from 1700' to 1400' and no longer quite butting directly onto the corridor under the 1500' Class D to the west of Bristol Airport.

The May issue of CHIRP deals with distraction and interruption—well worth a read.

A warning from the BGA: There has been a recent situation where a CAA-issued C of A has been revoked because the CAA was unable to contact the aircraft owner. The owner is of course unaware until the situation is discovered at ARC renewal. The BGA has approached the CAA registration department to seek reassurance that the CAA will exhaust all efforts (including assistance from other organisations) to contact an owner before taking the costly to the owner step of cancelling a C of A or aircraft registration. Meanwhile, we recommend that all owners ensure that the CAA registration department has the correct contact details for their aircraft. Of course, even for Permit aircraft it is important that the CAA has the correct contact details, as well as the LAA.

The next AIRAC update is on June 12th; don't forget to keep your electronic databases current.
