From AVWeb comes the following-

GOODYEAR BLIMP BLOOPER:

The 205-foot-long Goodyear blimp "Spirit of Akron" went down in woods south of Akron, Ohio, last week in what company officials called a "controlled descent," and the two crew aboard escaped with minor cuts and bruises. Some people would call it a crash, but a Goodyear spokesman said blimps move so slowly that even an unplanned landing can hardly be called a "crash." The pilot reported computer (?!) problems and dumped fuel before he guided the blimp nose-down into the woods. (Sounds like a crash to me!-Ed)

AIR BOTSWANA SUICIDE CRASH:

An Air Botswana pilot grounded because of an undisclosed medical problem last week killed himself and destroyed most of the airline's fleet. Captain Chris Phatswe, 35, took an ATR42 from the airline's hangars at Sir Seretse Khama Airport in Gaborone, circled the city twice, then did loops over the airport before diving into two parked planes. Phatswe gave airport controllers enough notice to clear the area of people but not of the planes, which were sitting on the tarmac awaiting passenger boarding.

VIPERJET MAKES FIRST FLIGHT:

Viper Aircraft of Pasco, Wash., announced the successful first flight of its kit-built ViperJet prototype on October 22 from Pasco airport. The ViperJet is a two-place tandem-seat aircraft with dual controls, advanced composite structure, and a Turbomeca Marbore 6 jet engine rated at 1,170 pounds of thrust.
